'Update on proposed pedestrian crossing in Ufton'.

Your Parish Councillors and Clerk had a teleconference with Warwickshire County Council on 18 December to discuss HS2's proposal to locate the crossing on the A425, on the right-hand side as, one exits from White Hart Lane (opposite the Sandwich shop).

We stated we are **strongly** opposed to the proposed location on safety grounds, as it will be too close to the roundabout. We all know some vehicles approaching Ufton from Leamington's direction do not obey the speed limit and so under some circumstances might not see a pedestrian on the crossing until too late. The Parish Council are also of the opinion the two businesses would suffer.

We have stated the crossing should instead be on the left as one exits from White Hart Lane, and before the entrance to the Private Road. This would reduce these risks (and act as a traffic calming measure for vehicles approaching from Southam). We also confirmed the pavement is wider at this point and better suits the installation of the control system.

We will keep you informed of any updates via the Newsletter.

Police and Crime Commissioners Consultation

The current Police and Crime Commissioner. Philip Seccombe is running a public consultation to give everyone the chance to give their views as he starts the process of setting the budget for policing across the next financial year. The 'Your Police, Your Views' survey aims to get your opinions on what you feel are the funding priorities for Warwickshire and how support services and community safety initiatives should be financed through grants and commissioning.

It comes as the Government set out its spending plans for 2021/22 in the Spending Review. announced last month by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Rishi Sunak. This confirmed funding remained in place for forces to continue to deliver the • a paper version of the questionnaire if you prefer recruitment of 20,000 new police officers nationally, while also providing additional new money to tackle violent crime, money laundering and increased counter-terrorism policing.

The Chancellor's announcement also signalled additional detail of how local police forces will be funded over the next financial year, with core central government grants likely to remain the same as this vear, providing a flat-cash settlement. Police and Crime Commissioners will be given flexibility to raise the portion of Council Tax which pays for policing, known as the Police Precept, by up to £15 for a Band D property.

The continued economic uncertainty, the ongoing challenges of the pandemic and increasing costs and other pressures do however mean that changes will be needed in order to set a balanced budget for the years ahead.

Census Day is Sunday 21 March

The census will soon be here. It is a survey which is undertaken by the Office of National Statistics every 10 years and it aims to give the most accurate estimate of people and households in England and Wales. All kinds of organisations, from local authorities to charities, use the information to help provide the services we all need, including transport, education and healthcare. Without the census, it would be much more difficult to do this.

Early in the New Year, households will receive a letter about the Census with a unique access code allowing them to complete the questionnaire online on their computers, phones or tablets. Paper questionnaires will be available on request. Census Day is Sunday 21 March, but you can fill yours in as soon as you get your access code in the post. Your answers should be about the people who usually live in your household on this date - even if you are filling it in before then. If your household circumstances change on Census Day, you can let the Office of National Statistics know.

If you cannot fill in your census questionnaire online, there will be a wide range of support services to make it easy for you, whatever your needs including:

- guidance and support in many languages and formats
- help over the phone, in a web chat or on social media
- · accessible census guidance, for example, in braille

MESSAGE FROM REV ANDY

One of the things I missed most about living on an island for the last 7 years was the lack of extreme weather. Our local climate was moderated by the sea, and so in the winter we were generally a few degrees warmer than other places, and in the summer a few degrees cooler. I love tropical days and balmy nights, just as I love thunderstorms and winter snowfall, and they were few and far between, although we had more than our fair share of rain and wind!

Climatologists tell us that we are heading for a time when lying snow will more or less disappear across the UK due to global warming, and indeed, snowfall, particularly at Christmas, has been very much a rarity in recent years.
