

Ellen Chimes 1927 - 2021



We are sorry to announce the death of Ellen who, with her husband Dave, managed the Village Shop and Post Office as well as the Garage here in Ufton for many years.

We send condolences to their sons, Tim and Nick and their families.

Ellen was born in Poplar, East London in 1927 and at the age of 11 was evacuated, with her siblings Olive and Pearl, to a family in Chipping Campden. They eventually settled in Warwickshire where Ellen met Dave who played the drums in a band where she went dancing after the war.

Ellen was always chatty and often laughing; they were very much a part of village life – indeed they were goodhearted and lovable.

May Elections

Has contributed the following to this month's newsletter. Written 9th May 1981.

When I was a child, my brother and I would return from choir practice at around 7:00pm. In the winter months, it was dark at this time. All streetlamps were tungsten and gave a white light which threw black shadows across the roads and cobbled entrys. I was afraid of the dark and my brother continually teased me about the "Bogey Man" who was hiding behind the black chimney pots on the houses, who would come and get me if I wasn't careful. Between this and concentrating on not stepping on the joints in the paving slabs lest I was sucked down into the river Mersey. I was terrified! This was written remembering those dark wet nights. It is:

The Bogeyman

Huddled on a rooftop in the freezing falling rain.

Watching in the twilight the figures in the lane Of little children playing and splashing in the pools,

Happy joyful voices running home from school.

And there he meets with other ghosts and demons of great fright.

When at last the night is past and Dawn begins to rise,

Ufton Village Precept

Local Council Tax bills have hit our doormats recently and you may have noticed the village precept part has increased by 4%. The amount of money the Parish Council asked for was the same amount as for the year 2020 – 2021.

Stratford District Council advised the following: Whilst the Ufton total precept remained the same for 2021/22 as the previous year at £8,970 the amount that appears on the bill does depend on the taxbase figure.

The taxbase is the number of properties in the parish worked back to a band D figure. The relationship between the bands is shown below and based on 1/9ths.

The table shows a band H property pays twice that of a band D and a band A pays 6/9ths. So, for Ufton the taxbase dropped between 2020/21 and 2021/22 from 106.26 to 101.70. The calculation for 2020/21 was £8,970 / 106.26 = £84.41 precept on a band D property bill

For 2021/22 the calculation is £8,970 / 101.70 = £88.20 precept on a band D property bill.

In simple terms the same bill is being divided by a smaller number of people, so each pays a little more.

MESSAGE FROM REV ANDY

As we commemorate the one-year anniversary of lockdown due to the pandemic it seems that we have been surrounded by bad news for the past 12 months. The strain on the NHS, the impact on the economy and education, the loss of loved ones and the enforced isolation has affected us all. Sometimes the focus on Coronavirus has eclipsed all the other things going on in the world. For example, last year category 4 Hurricanes devastated lives and communities in Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua; and currently in Australia, New South Wales has been hit by once in a century flooding. A huge explosion in Beirut left over 200 people dead and thousands injured, and as always, a variety of conflicts have continued to cause misery and suffering across the world. Maybe we wonder where God is in all of this. Maybe we are tempted to blame him for allowing these things in the first place.

Of course, much of what we term natural disasters are simply a consequence of our planet Earth being a place where life thrive in the first place. Plate tectonics, the process responsible for earthquakes, also recycles carbon, which stabilises the planets temperature Hurricanes are a natural and recurring consequence of our dynamic climate system, although much of the scientific community believe they are worsening as a result of man-made global warming. Even viruses have played a vital part in the evolution of human beings despite the many deaths they sometimes cause.

God could have created a world where we are protected from all danger, but without risk how dull would life be, and how much wonder and beauty would we lose? A snowstorm can be deadly for anyone caught out in it, but it transforms the landscape around us into something magical. Climbing a mountain, sailing an ocean, exploring the moon are risky endeavours, but that longing for adventure and challenge are part of human nature we celebrate.

Some of the blame for human suffering must lie squarely at our door. Global warming, ethnic cleansing, and famines are something we have caused, or allow to happen. We look the other way while so many live-in conditions which put them at risk, we allow injustice and prejudice to wreck lives and communities. And yet sometimes our response to disaster also brings out the best in us, displayed in courage, compassion, and generosity. We have seen this displayed time and again during the past year.

Maybe in all of this there are lessons we need to learn, maybe we can heed Gods call to make our world a better place by the way in which we care for each other, and take responsibility for one another, something Jesus demonstrated so vividly when he gave up his life for us, his friends.
