# Warwickshire Police Rural Crime Team

#### Street Safe Information

Warwickshire Police is supporting Street Safe, a new national online tool to allow people to flag places where they have felt unsafe. The system, which is primarily aimed at women and girls, allows members of the public to anonymously drop a pin onto a map and describe factors that caused them concern and led to them feeling unsafe.

Superintendent Mike Smith, community and response policing lead for Warwickshire Police, said: "We're pleased to support and promote this national initiative. Everyone has a right to walk the streets safely and we are committed to ensuring this happens. A key part of this is tackling violence against women.

"We will use the information collected by this tool alongside other community intelligence to identify areas of concern and put measures in place to address them."

## Please see below some useful guidance relating to scams.

Advice around scamming calls and emails Some simple tools to help deal with scamming phone calls or mail.

Vulnerable people are increasingly being targeted by organised fraudsters via relentless phone calling or unsolicited mail. The services highlighted below are simple to use and may be effective in assisting vulnerable members of the community, your own relatives and friends or even you yourself.

Scamming or nuisance calls - trueCall38.

If contact details are required when completing a form in person or online, the phone number '0333 88 88 88', can be used instead of your actual number, to avoid any unwanted phone contact. Should the associated company, or anyone given access to your details call, a short, recorded message is played: 'trueCall38 is handling my calls. I prefer not to be contacted by phone, so please contact me via my email address. Goodbye!'

"Stop, hang up and call 159"

The UK-wide 159 call service is designed to give consumers a safe route to contact their banks. The scheme urges people to "stop, hang up and call 159" to check calls are genuine. The idea is to help those who believe they have been contacted by scammers claiming to be their bank, or by fraudsters who encouraged them to transfer money.

Telephone Preference Service (TPS)

This service aims to reduce the number of unwanted sales and marketing calls received. The TPS is a free service. Registration is online at <u>http://www.tpsonline.org.uk/</u> or by calling 0345 070 0707.

Scamming or nuisance mail Mailing Preference Service (MPS)

The MPS aims to reduce the amount of direct marketing mail. The MPS is a free service. Register online <u>atvwww.mpsonline.org.uk</u> or by calling 0207 291 3310.

Royal Mail Freepost Scam Mail

If someone is receiving scam mail in the post, it can be sent to the Royal Mail, by posting it directly to FREEPOST SCAM MAIL.

Royal Mail's paid-for redirection service

This enables people to have their post delivered to a trusted friend or relative. Applications are online at

# News on Pedestrian Crossing for Ufton.

On Tuesday 12 October members of your Parish Council met with HS2 and Balfour Beatty to discuss the proposed siting of the Puffin crossing. You may recall HS2 had proposed 3 sites, each of which we considered unsuitable, and proposed a better one. At this meeting HS2/ BBV agreed to our preference, and (subject to final design and approval, which we believe will be a formality), the crossing is set to be built accordingly. We expect completion in spring 2022 but will not be able to improve on this. The Parish Council is nevertheless pleased with this step forward, some 7 years from our request to the House of Commons Select Committee, and much work and determination to win this new facility.

#### **Reflection**

#### "God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform"

So runs the first two lines of a hymn with which many will be familiar, and one could argue that is certainly true of the current shortage of vicars! Not only here in Ufton, which Revd Andy Batchelor shares with Harbury and Ladbroke, but also the wider church up and down the country. Andy cannot be in three places at once and that was certainly true for Ufton's Harvest Service in October, but Revd Bob Clucas was able to be with us instead and to provide a moving and uplifting Service, and one that echoed those first two lines of that hymn perfectly.

Born a "Brummie," Bob was towards the end of his training to be ordained when, in 1980, it became necessary to make a journey to Bedford with his wife Ann. A poor curate and short of funds his father-in-law gave them a tenner to "get something to eat" and they broke their journey at a small wayside pub. By that time, Bob already knew where his first parish would be – one of the poorest and most dangerous areas of Liverpool, one where they would find heroin addicts as neighbours and a tough life on the streets for one and all. As they sat in that pub window, waiting for lunch to be served and gazing at that wonderful valley that lay below and the vista beyond, Bob must have had an inclination of what lay in store when he remarked to Ann "not for us."

Time marched on; they spent 5 years in Liverpool and with two children in tow, Bob felt a calling to become involved in youth work. He went after four jobs in the Liverpool area and got nowhere and then someone reminded him to look at the vacancies in the Church Times, which brings us nicely to the last two lines in verse 5 of our hymn:

#### "The bud may have a bitter taste, but sweet will be the flower"

That *"flower"* proved to be the offer of youth work in the Southam area and the opportunity to live in Bishops Itchington. Why was the *"flower"* so important? Because it was only when they went for a meal in our very own White Hart, here in Ufton that they realised they were sitting in that very same window of the pub they had visited back in 1980 that Bob had declared was "not for us".
